





This Week's Reflection...

Dear Parish Family,

This month of October is Respect Life Month and marks a time for us to reflect upon the gift of human life and our personal responsibility in caring for and protecting the lives of all our brothers and sisters, born and unborn. Pope John Paul II in his encyclical The Gospel of Life powerfully proclaimed the right of children in the womb, elderly, disabled, and the marginalized.

The bishops of the U.S. have affirmed that 'the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed.'

Abortion is a reality in our wider society and sometimes in our daily lives. As I reflect upon this I'm reminded of how this reality has touched upon my own life and ministry.

I call to mind:

The child who explained to her Sunday-school teacher that her mother would be delayed in picking her up due to the family's au-pair being dropped off at the abortion clinic.

The young non-Catholic pregnant woman who came seeking help because her catholic boyfriend (the father of the child) and his devout catholic family were placing considerable pressure upon her to 'terminate the pregnancy' – to abort the child.

The pregnant mother who was considering aborting her unborn child because she had been given a diagnosed of a possible fetal abnormality.

Sitting in a waiting room, as the woman across from me unabashedly and loudly explained on her cellphone that her daughter-in-law was at that time undergoing an abortion.

The young girl who confided in a fellow teen that she had had an abortion, who in turn told everyone. Certain parishioners denounced the girl inflicting wound upon wound, causing the girl to leave the parish and possibly the church.

When teaching or preaching about life issues and in particular abortion I am mindful of the reality that there is at least one girl or woman in the congregation who has had an abortion. I have no right (none of us has) to stand in judgement or to inflict further hurt upon those already wounded. The only message the Church has to offer such a person is the compassionate love of Jesus Christ and his tender mercy – mercy generously offered. No sin, not even the sin of abortion is beyond his mercy, freely given in the sacrament of reconciliation.

It this month ahead while giving preeminent priority to the threat of abortion, let us also be mindful of other Pro-life issues including poverty, racism, euthanasia, the death penalty, displaced immigrants and refugees. Each one of is called to protect the most fundamental of all human rights – the right to life.

LATEST PARISH UPDATES

Listed below are the many new protocols that all parishioners must follow to attend Mass at St. James. **Please read through these guidelines carefully.** These protocols are borne out of concern for the well-being of all of our parish family and the greater community of which we are a part. Thank you for your patience and cooperation during this challenging time. They will be reviewed often and updated as necessary. YOU MUST SUPPLY YOUR OWN MASK and masks must be worn by everyone age 10 and older when present on our campus.

DISPENSATION FROM THE OBLIGATION TO ATTEND MASS

The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass for persons with health reasons or concerns remains in effect for all in the Archdiocese until further notice. Because of this, those wishing to participate in Mass and receive Holy Communion can do so by attending any Mass any day of the week. The obligation to keep a holy Sabbath remains, and Catholics are reminded that, even while homebound, they are to devote themselves to, among other practices, personal prayer, meditation on the readings from the Sunday Mass and the making of a spiritual Communion.

Those who are at risk or concerned that they or their family might become sick should stay at home and view live-streamed or online Masses. We urge those who have serious health issues, who are most vulnerable, who are not feeling well, or who fear for their own health, to refrain from attending church during this time.**

LIVE STREAMED MASSES - Several parishes in the Archdiocese of Atlanta are offering televised masses. Go to the Archdiocese website/Covid –19 update/Spiritual Resources/List of masses livestreamed or broadcast.

WEEKEND & WEEKDAY MASS GUIDELINES

Weekend Mass times will be Saturday at 4 pm; Sunday Mass times are 8:00 am, 9:30 am and 11:00 am. Weekday Mass times will be 8:30 am Monday through Friday and at 7 pm Wednesdays. There will be no weekday Masses on Saturdays - only the Vigil Mass at 4PM will be offered.

ARRIVAL PROCEDURES

- You must be wearing a mask to be permitted into the church for Mass. (PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN MASK)
- Take your temperature and avoid coming to church if your temperature is 99.6 or greater.
- Restrooms are open for emergencies only; children must be accompanied by an adult.
- A mask is required to be worn during the reception of Holy Communion. (PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN MASK)
- Entrance to the church will be through the glass doors only.
- In order to facilitate social distancing of 6 feet or more between individuals (households are considered one group) during Mass, Mass Ambassadors will help guide everyone to their seats.

DURING MASS

- There is to be no physical contact between households at the Sign of Peace or Lord's Prayer.
- Reception of Holy Communion will be in the hand only at this time.
- Use of personal hand sanitizer before Holy Communion is strongly encouraged.
- Follow the directions of the Mass Ambassadors.
- Masks should be worn in the communion line. When approaching the priest, deacon or extraordinary minister for Communion, place your hands, one underneath the other with your arms fully extended.
- Do not reach for or close your hands around the Sacred Host. The Sacred Host will be placed on your hand by the priest, deacon or extraordinary minister and then will be released to rest on your hand to avoid any contact by the priest/minister of your hand.
- After receiving Communion, step to the side, remove your mask, consume the Eucharist, re-mask as you head back to your pew.
- As you return to your pew maintain social distancing from those near you.

DEPARTURE PROCEDURES

- Exit as quickly as possible after Mass. Follow the directions of the Mass Ambassadors as you leave. Be sure to maintain a 6-foot social distance as you exit and walk to your cars.
- Please make sure you take all your belongings as you leave because sanitization of the church will begin immediately.

FOR WEEKEND MASSES ONLY:

- Collections will take place as you enter the church. <u>But we encourage everyone to make use of online giving. You can visit our website for more information about online giving.</u>
- Please throw away or keep your liturgy sheets. Do not leave them on your seat.
- For those who would feel more comfortable attending Mass in your car we will be broadcasting the audio of the Mass. When you park you will see instructions on how to dial into the audio broadcast. You will come to the courtyard overhang area to receive Holy Communion.

CONFESSION

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is held on Saturdays at 9:00 am and Wednesdays from 6-7pm. Confession times will be Saturdays at 9:00 am and Wednesdays at 6:00 pm. You must be wearing a mask to be permitted into the building for Confession. (PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN MASK.) Before you arrive take your temperature and avoid coming to church if your temperature is 99.6 or greater. Entrance to the parish hall will be through the glass doors. Please maintain social distancing of 6 feet or more between individuals (households are considered one group.) Please keep your face mask on at all times, especially for confession.

ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament has resumed on Wednesdays from 6-7pm. Please familiarize yourself with the following guidelines: You must be wearing a mask to be permitted into the building for Adoration. (PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN MASK.) Take your temperature and avoid coming to church if your temperature is 99.6 or greater. Entrance to the parish hall will be through the glass doors. In order to facilitate social distancing of 6 feet or more between individuals (households are considered one group) during Adoration, ushers will help guide everyone to their seats. Restrooms are open for emergencies only; children must be accompanied by an adult.


